





Ellie looked out the window.





"The **storm** made the **power** go out," said Mom.






Dad lit candles.

"The school is closed," Dad said with a tired smile.






"Just think! We can spend the day doing whatever we like!" she said.



The family told **spooky** stories in front of the fire.





The power was still out the next day.
